## Thoughts and Advice from Pastor Joe, St. Mark UMC, November 2023 Methodist Education: A brief celebration of the life of Jóvita Idár

In honor of All Saints Day, I thought I would share part of an article about a locally-famous Methodist saint: Jóvita Idar, a South Texas journalist and activist from Laredo who was a lifelong Methodist. Below are excerpts from an October 4, 2022 article in United Methodist News, written by Sam Hodges, title "Spotlight shines on Jovita Idár, Methodist reformer." <sup>1</sup>

"Though she's still not a household name, [Jovita] Idár's heroic advocacy for Mexican Americans, as well as for women and children, has made her the subject of scholarly articles, a documentary and a historical marker...Idár was a lifelong, faithful Methodist. Idár was born into a large, educated, relatively well-off Mexican American family on Sept. 7, 1885, in Laredo, Texas. Her maternal grandfather was the Rev. Clemente Abraham Vivero, a Methodist minister. In her youth, Jovita Idár attended Laredo Seminary, a Methodist school that would become known as Holding Institute, after the school's Methodist missionary leader Nannie Emory Holding. After graduating in 1903, Idár taught impoverished Mexican American children in tiny Los Ojuelos, Texas. But she didn't teach for long, instead joining her father's newspaper. "Appalled by the poor conditions and inadequate equipment as well as the lack of hope in this community, she resigned and turned to political journalism, working alongside her brothers and father and using the media to foment social change," Claudia González wrote in a chapter on Idár for the book "Texas Women: Their Histories, Their Lives."

Surely the most cinematic moment of Idár's career came in 1914, when El Progreso, the Laredo newspaper she was then working for, published an editorial critical of President Woodrow Wilson for ordering a U.S. military occupation in Veracruz, Mexico. A team of Texas Rangers soon arrived at the newspaper, intending to shut it down in retaliation. They had a surprise. "One of (El Progreso's) writers, a slender, twenty-nine-year-old woman named Jovita Idár, stood in the doorway to block them. As a crowd formed, the Rangers backed away," wrote Doug J. Swanson in his 2020 book "Cult of Glory: The Bold and Brutal History of the Texas Rangers.""

I hope you get a chance to read the rest of the UM News article about Jóvita Idár, and that, as you remember the saints who have blessed your life directly, you also take time to celebrate the "great cloud of witnesses" (Hebrews 12:1) who have come before us. So many of these men & Department of the promise of our United Methodist baptismal vows, to "accept the freedom and power God gives you to resist evil, injustice, and oppression in whatever forms they present themselves."

#### **The Christ and Disciple Windows**

Through the medium of stained glass, Laverne and Alvin Todd have created these beautiful windows in honor of their grandchildren, Jennifer and James Ordner and Jared Todd Tucker and donated them to St. Mark United Methodist Church.

During late spring and summer of 1979, with the construction of the new addition to the Sanctuary underway, the Todds approached Rev. David Edgar with the proposition that they would create and install stained glass windows in the side windows of the new addition as a donation. Subsequent bids from various studios were received for stained glass for the large window pursuant to which the Todds were requested to submit a bid on the large window. They responded with an offer to include the large window along with the side windows in their donation.

To assist in the project, a volunteer committee from the congregation, composed of Ed Cohrs, Gerrie Fritts, Ann Robertson, Rosalyn Smith, Ilene Boje and chaired by Dr. Bill Caldwell, was selected. The purpose of this committee was to select the subject matter to be depicted in the large window. After several weeks of much research and visits to numerous churches, the decision was made to depict the figure of Christ. Ilene Boje, with her expertise as an artist and painter, was selected to scale out the figure of Christ for the window, which involved many hours of dedicated time. The Todds completed the drawing, including dividing it into fifteen separate panels, placement of lead line to assure continuous flow from panel to panel and determining dimensions of each panel. The drawing was traced off and a pattern for each piece of glass in the window was made.

After a selection of glass colors was made, the Todds travelled to California where they selected the glass to be incorporated in the project. That selection included opalescent, antique and cathedral glass from England, France and West Germany, as well as U.S. made glass.



The first piece of glass for the windows was cut on August 8, 1979 and after innumerable man hours of work and the aid of prayers, the large window was installed on November 5th. Each panel was constructed separately with each piece of glass hand cut, arranged and secured in place with lead caming. The stability was increased by framing each panel with zinc and securing reinforcing bars on the reverse side. This was followed by applying a glazing compound to secure the glass within the lead came, and finished off with a polishing compound.

To effectively reflect the features of the figure of Christ, and the border pieces, it was necessary to employ a special glass paint. After many laborious hours, the painting was completed through the efforts and expertise of Ilene Boje, necessitating kiln firing on the head piece a total of six times.

The decision to depict the twelve disciples in the side windows was at the suggestion of Rev. David Edgar. Since we had the central figure of Christ, to complete the picture, the twelve disciples would be represented by symbol.

The Todds constructed these windows in basically the same manner as the large window, incorporating the copper foil method with the lead came. The painting involved in the side windows was done by the Todds and the lettering by Ilene Boje, the final installation being on January 23, 1980. The windows were dedicated on Sunday, April 13, 1980.

The Todds have indicated that this gesture was their way of saying thanks for the many blessings received from the Lord and their association with the church.
